# We Hear God's Word

# First Reading

# Numbers 11:4-6, 10-16, 24-29

The rabble among them had a strong craving; and the Israelites also wept again, and said, "If only we had meat to eat! We remember the fish we used to eat in Egypt for nothing, the cucumbers, the melons, the leeks, the onions, and the garlic; but now our strength is dried up, and there is nothing at all but this manna to look at."

Moses heard the people weeping throughout their families, all at the entrances of their tents. Then the Lord became very angry, and Moses was displeased. So Moses said to the Lord, "Why have you treated your servant so badly? Why have I not found favor in your sight, that you lay the burden of all this people on me? Did I conceive all this people? Did I give birth to them, that you should say to me, 'Carry them in your bosom, as a nurse carries a sucking child, to the land that you promised on oath to their ancestors'? Where am I to get meat to give to all this people? For they come weeping to me and say, 'Give us meat to eat!' I am not able to carry all this people alone, for they are too heavy for me. If this is the way you are going to treat me, put me to death at once—if I have found favor in your sight—and do not let me see my misery."

So the Lord said to Moses, "Gather for me seventy of the elders of Israel, whom you know to be the elders of the people and officers over them; bring them to the tent of meeting, and have them take their place there with you."

So Moses went out and told the people the words of the Lord; and he gathered seventy elders of the people, and placed them all around the tent. Then the Lord came down in the cloud and spoke to him, and took some of the spirit that was on him and put it on the seventy elders; and when the spirit rested upon them, they prophesied. But they did not do so again.

Two men remained in the camp, one named Eldad, and the other named Medad, and the spirit rested on them; they were among those registered, but they had not gone out to the tent, and so they prophesied in the camp. And a young man ran and told Moses, "Eldad and Medad are prophesying in the camp." And Joshua son of Nun, the assistant of Moses, one of his chosen men, said, "My lord Moses, stop them!" But Moses said to him, "Are you jealous for my sake? Would that all the Lord's people were prophets, and that the Lord would put his spirit on them!"

James 5:13-20



"For everyone will be salted with fire. Salt is good; but if salt has lost its saltiness, how can you season it? Have salt in yourselves, and be at peace with one another."



The focus for our biblical work was Genesis 28:10-22. This story tells of Jacob's dream of a ladder, or stairway, that reached from earth to heaven. Jacob dreams God's angels were on this ladder, ascending and descending. Jacob saw God standing above the ladder and repeats the covenant God has made with Abraham and Isaac: that their children would be many and be blessed. When Jacob awoke, he believed God was present in that place, took the stone he had been using to rest his head, anointed it with oil and consecrated it to God. Jacob calls this place Bethel – which means "house of God". The Team encourages each of you to read this story and think on what it might be saying to you.

With the thought of Bethel, the "house of God" firmly in our minds, the Discernment Team started focusing on "Our Extended Present", describing for ourselves and then sharing with others what this moment in the life of Bethel looks and feels like. We tried to address the important events and important people in our lives at Bethel, our feelings dominating our lives and the physical conditions each of us is dealing with. The sharing was deep and reflective as we considered where Bethel is headed: we shared our thoughts on Bethel's Present Life, and how each person visualized Bethel's future.

We had a time to reflect in a one to one conversation a time when we were afraid and were able to act anyway. This gave each person in the team time to reflect on how they coped with a challenge they faced, as the congregation faces unknown situations in its future. These conversations deepened our relationships with each other and how we will be able to encourage the same deep relationship building within all members of the congregation.

Finally the Team took a look at the upcoming year and the activities Bethel will be taking on in its future. The work before us is challenging and exciting. Thanks be to God.

# Worship Notes



#### For September 30, October 7 and 14

We continue our exploration into the wide-ranging ways in which the people of God rightly pray the Lord's Prayer. For the next three Sundays, we will pray the Lord's Prayer in the Roman Catholic tradition, as it currently appears in the celebration of the Roman liturgy. The most significant difference is the way in which the doxology is recited.

In the early Church, the Christians living in the eastern half of the Roman Empire added the doxology "for thine is the kingdom..." to the gospel text of the Our Father when reciting the prayer at Mass. Evidence of this practice is also found in the Didache (Teaching of the Twelve Apostles), a first century manual of morals, worship, and doctrine of the Church. When copying the scriptures, Greek scribes sometimes appended the doxology onto the original Gospel text; most Roman texts today would omit this inclusion, relegate it to a footnote, or note that it was a later addition to the Gospel. Official "Catholic" Bibles have never included this doxology.

In 1969, following the conclusion of the Second Vatican Council, the doxology was added to the Catholic Mass, not as part of the "Our Father", but following shortly afterwards. While Lutheran pastors are not ordained as priests, in our prayer today, we will follow the Roman form of the recitation of the prayer.





#### NO ON MEASURE 105 CAMPAIGN

Promoted by hate groups in and out of state, Ballot Measure 105 will appear on November's ballot. Measure 105 will throw out Oregon's thirty-year-old "sanctuary law," a statute that has protected our most core values by disentangling local and state law enforcement from federal immigration enforcement.

**Shared Values:** People of faith are bound together by a shared vision that calls us to live the core practices of hospitality, inclusion and community.

- Vision of Beloved Community: Faith traditions around the world cast a vision of a reality in which all people are in right relationship with one another. This kind of sacred "beloved community" is written about in all our holy scriptures in a variety of names. We are grounded in this vision and our hope for the restoration of all things. We live this vision into being now through collective action that embodies the beloved community and cries for justice.
- **Equity and Inclusion**: Sacred texts across tradition call people of faith into the practice of equity and inclusion for those sojourning through their lands. Thirty six times the Hebrew scriptures command the following: "The foreigner who lives among you must be treated like one of your own. Love them as you love yourself, for you too were a foreigner in the land of Egypt."
- United, Interdependent and Diverse Community: We are called to create communities united in common purpose and vision, embracing our differences in background, color,creed and country of origin, yet refusing to allow the world to divide us because of them. In Buddhism, the core concept of interdependence applies to the laws of our state. The web of life is a complex and infinitely rich tapestry in which everything and everyone is interwoven. It is easy to view those who are different from us as separate and unrelated but this is an illusion. Our well-being depends on the well-being of those around us.

As people of faith, we recognize when the laws of the state help or hinder our movement toward a more just and peaceful reality for our neighborhoods and our world. We commit now to resist this act of white supremacy and xenophobia, and we encourage people of good faith across Oregon to vote NO on Measure 105.
