We were created in relationship and for relationship. **We are created for community!**


God knew it was not right for us to be alone. **We are created for community!**

We Hear God's Word

First Reading

Genesis 2:18-24

The Lord God said, "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper as his partner." So out of the ground the Lord God formed every animal of the field and every bird of the air, and brought them to the man to see what he would call them; and whatever the man called every living creature, that was its name. The man gave names to all cattle, and to the birds of the air, and to every animal of the field; but for the man there was not found a helper as his partner. So the Lord God caused a deep sleep to fall upon the man, and he slept; then he took one of his ribs and closed up its place with flesh. And the rib that the Lord God had taken from the man he made into a woman and brought her to the man. Then the man said, "This at last is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; this one shall be called Woman, for out of Man this one was taken."

Therefore a man leaves his father and his mother and clings to his wife, and they become one flesh.

Second Reading

Hebrews 1:1-4; 2:5-12

Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds. He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs.


Now God did not subject the coming world, about which we are speaking, to angels. But someone has testified somewhere, "What are human beings that you are mindful of them, or mortals, that you care for them? You have made them for a little while lower than the angels; you have crowned them with glory and honor, subjecting all things under their feet."

Now in subjecting all things to them, God left nothing outside their control. As it is, we do not yet see everything in subjection to them, but we do see Jesus, who for a little while was made lower than the angels, now crowned with glory and honor because of the suffering of death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone.

It was fitting that God, for whom and through whom all things exist, in bringing many children to glory, should make the pioneer of their salvation perfect through sufferings. For the one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one Father. For this reason Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters, saying, "I will proclaim your name to my brothers and sisters, in the midst of the congregation I will praise you."

The Holy Gospel according to Mark, the tenth chapter.

Some Pharisees came, and to test [Jesus] they asked, "Is it lawful for a man to divorce his wife?" He answered them, "What did Moses command you?" They said, "Moses allowed a man to write a certificate of dismissal and to divorce her." But Jesus said to them, "Because of your hardness of heart he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation, 'God made them male and female.' 'For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh.' So they are no longer two, but one flesh. Therefore what God has joined together, let no one separate."

Then in the house the disciples asked him again about this matter. He said to them, "Whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery against her; and if she divorces her husband and marries another, she commits adultery."

People were bringing little children to him in order that he might touch them; and the disciples spoke sternly to them. But when Jesus saw this, he was indignant and said to them, "Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it." And he took them up in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them.



Speak to us, O God, in the breaking of the bread and make us one with you.



Bethel Discernment Team Inaugural Retreat, September 22, 2018

The focus for our biblical work was Genesis 28:10-22. This story tells of Jacob's dream of a ladder, or stairway, that reached from earth to heaven. Jacob dreams God's angels were on this ladder, ascending and descending. Jacob saw God standing above the ladder and repeats the covenant God has made with Abraham and Isaac: that their children would be many and be blessed. When Jacob awoke, he believed God was present in that place, took the stone he had been using to rest his head, anointed it with oil and consecrated it to God. Jacob calls this place Bethel – which means "house of God". The Team encourages each of you to read this story and think on what it might be saying to you.

With the thought of Bethel, the "house of God" firmly in our minds, the Discernment Team started focusing on "Our Extended Present", describing for ourselves and then sharing with others what this moment in the life of Bethel looks and feels like. We tried to address the important events and important people in our lives at Bethel, our feelings dominating our lives and the physical conditions each of us is dealing with. The sharing was deep and reflective as we considered where Bethel is headed: we shared our thoughts on Bethel's Present Life, and how each person visualized Bethel's future.

We had a time to reflect in a one to one conversation a time when we were afraid and were able to act anyway. This gave each person in the team time to reflect on how they coped with a challenge they faced, as the congregation faces unknown situations in its future. These conversations deepened our relationships with each other and how we will be able to encourage the same deep relationship building within all members of the congregation.

Finally the Team took a look at the upcoming year and the activities Bethel will be taking on in its future. The work before us is challenging and exciting. Thanks be to God.

Worship Notes

For September 30, October 7 and 14

We continue our exploration into the wide-ranging ways in which the people of God rightly pray the Lord's Prayer. For the next three Sundays, we will pray the Lord's Prayer in the Roman Catholic tradition, as it currently appears in the celebration of the Roman liturgy. The most significant difference is the way in which the doxology is recited.

In the early Church, the Christians living in the eastern half of the Roman Empire added the doxology "for thine is the kingdom..." to the gospel text of the Our Father when reciting the prayer at Mass. Evidence of this practice is also found in the Didache (Teaching of the Twelve Apostles), a first century manual of morals, worship, and doctrine of the Church. When copying the scriptures, Greek scribes sometimes appended the doxology onto the original Gospel text; most Roman texts today would omit this inclusion, relegate it to a footnote, or note that it was a later addition to the Gospel. Official "Catholic" Bibles have never included this doxology.

In 1969, following the conclusion of the Second Vatican Council, the doxology was added to the Catholic Mass, not as part of the "Our Father", but following shortly afterwards. While Lutheran pastors are not ordained as priests, in our prayer today, we will follow the Roman form of the recitation of the prayer.

Interfaith Movement for Immigrant Justice (IMIrJ)

We are on a journey. A Journey to end injustice and a journey to political action as we seek the defeat of Measure 105, which would end Oregon's 30 year old law granting Sanctuary Status

On Sunday, we gathered for a rally at the Sheridan prison, celebrating that the majority of asylumseeking men who had been detained there since June have been released - and strengthening our resolve to continue fighting for the freedom of the dozen or so who remain imprisoned.

After the rally we were blessed to share a langar (community meal) prepared by our Sikh friends and to witness a beautiful rainbow stretching straight from the prison out over the barbed wire fence.

On Monday, our Sheridan to NORCOR crew took to the road, then made a quick decision to change course and hold a rapid response rally in front of the Washington County Courthouse after learning that ICE agents had detained two community members inside the courthouse earlier that day.

On Tuesday, participants journeyed to Newberg, talking to neighbors about the importance of voting No on 105, and concluding the evening with a community meal, song and stories.

On Wednesday, we made our way from Forest Grove to Hillsboro, with a stop at St. Alexander Catholic Church for lunch and fellowship with long-time Latino community leaders. Back to the Washington County Courthouse for a vigil, joined by the mother of 1 of the men who detained Monday.

Thursday was the pilgrimage across Portland. The day included a demonstration of solidarity in front of the Portland Immigration and Customs Enforcement Building/ We will again demand ICE ends its at NORCOR and Sheridan. The march continued to several locations about Portland and ended in a rally and street event outside the Congressional offices at Holladay Park in NE Portland.

Friday – it was on to Hood River and The Dalles!

Join us in continuing prayer and action as we journey - from fear to faith, from hate to embrace.
