### 1st Reading

#### The Meal: Preparations

It was two days before Passover and the Festival of Unleavened Bread. The chief priests and legal experts through cunning tricks were searching for a way to arrest Jesus and kill him. But they agreed that it shouldn't happen during the festival; otherwise, there would be uproar among the people.

On the first day of the Festival of Unleavened Bread, when the Passover lamb was sacrificed, the disciples said to Jesus, "Where do you want us to prepare for you to eat the Passover meal?"

He sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the city. A man carrying a water jar will meet you. Follow him. Wherever he enters, say to the owner of the house, 'The teacher asks, "Where is my guest room where I can eat the Passover meal with my disciples?" 'He will show you a large room upstairs already furnished. Prepare for us there."

The disciples left came into the city, found everything just as he had told them, and they prepared the Passover meal.

That evening, Jesus arrived with the Twelve. During the meal, Jesus said, "I assure you that one of you will betray me—someone eating with me."

Deeply saddened, they asked him, one by one, "It's not me, is it?"

Jesus answered, "It's one of the Twelve, one who is dipping bread with me into this bowl. The Human One goes to his death just as it is written about him. But how terrible it is for that person who betrays the Human One! It would have been better for him if he had never been born."

While they were eating, Jesus took bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave it to them, and said, "Take; this is my body." He took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, and they all drank from it. He said to them, "This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many. I assure you that I won't drink wine again until that day when I drink it in a new way in God's kingdom." After singing songs of praise, they went out to the Mount of Olives.

Jesus said to them, "You will all falter in your faithfulness to me. It is written, I will hit the shepherd, and the sheep will go off in all directions. But after I'm raised up, I will go before you to Galilee."

#### **Confession and Forgiveness**

### 2<sup>nd</sup> Reading

## The Garden

Peter said to him, "Even if everyone else stumbles, I won't."

But Jesus said to him, "I assure you that on this very night, before the rooster crows twice, you will deny me three times."

Peter insisted, "If I must die alongside you, I won't deny you." And they all said the same thing.

Jesus and his disciples came to a place called Gethsemane. Jesus said to them, "Sit here while I pray."

He took Peter, James, and John along with him. He began to feel despair and was anxious. He said to them, "I'm very sad. It's as if I'm dying. Stay here and keep alert."

He came a third time and said to them, "Will you sleep and rest all night? That's enough! The time has come for the Human One to be betrayed into the hands of sinners. Get up! Let's go! Look, here comes my betrayer."

Suddenly, while Jesus was still speaking, Judas, one of the Twelve, came with a mob carrying swords and clubs. They had been sent by the chief priests, legal experts, and elders. His betrayer had given them a sign:

"Arrest the man I kiss, and take him away under guard."

As soon as he got there, Judas said to Jesus, "Rabbi!"

Then he kissed him. Then they came and grabbed Jesus and arrested him. One of the bystanders drew a sword and struck the high priest's slave and cut off his ear. Jesus responded,

"Have you come with swords and clubs to arrest me, like an outlaw? Day after day, I was with you, teaching in the temple, but you didn't arrest me. But let the scriptures be fulfilled."

And all his disciples left him and ran away. One young man, a disciple, was wearing nothing but a linen cloth. They grabbed him, but he left the linen cloth behind and ran away naked. **Hymn of Reflection**

## 3<sup>rd</sup> Reading

They led Jesus away to the high priest, and all the chief priests, elders, and legal experts gathered. Peter followed him from a distance, right into the high priest's courtyard. "We heard him saying, 'I will destroy this temple, constructed by humans, and within three days I will build another, one not made by humans.' "

But their testimonies didn't agree even on this point.

Then the high priest stood up in the middle of the gathering and examined Jesus.

"Aren't you going to respond to the testimony these people have brought against you?"

But Jesus was silent and didn't answer. Again, the high priest asked,

"Are you the Christ, the Son of the blessed one?"

Jesus said,

"I am. And you will see the Human One sitting on the right side of the Almighty and coming on the heavenly clouds."

Then the high priest tore his clothes and said,

"Why do we need any more witnesses? You've heard his insult against God. What do you think? "

They all condemned him.

"He deserves to die!"

Some began to spit on him. Some covered his face and hit him, saying, "Prophesy!" Then the guards took him and beat him.

### 4<sup>th</sup> Reading

At daybreak, the chief priests—with the elders, legal experts, and the whole Sanhedrin—formed a plan.

They bound Jesus, led him away, and turned him over to Pilate. Pilate questioned him, "Are you the king of the Jews?"

Jesus replied, "That's what you say."

The chief priests were accusing him of many things. Pilate asked him again, "Aren't you going to answer? What about all these accusations?"

But Jesus gave no more answers so that Pilate marveled.

## 5<sup>th</sup> Reading

### **Kings and Power**

During the festival, Pilate released one prisoner to them, whomever they requested. A man named Barabbas was locked up with the rebels who had committed murder during an uprising. The crowd pushed forward and asked Pilate to release someone, as he regularly did. Pilate answered them, "Do you want me to release to you the king of the Jews?"

He knew that the chief priests had handed him over because of jealousy. So the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release Barabbas to them instead. Pilate replied, "Then what do you want me to do with the one you call king of the Jews?"

They shouted back, "Crucify him!"

Pilate said to them, "Why? What wrong has he done?"

They shouted even louder, "Crucify him!"

Pilate wanted to satisfy the crowd, so he released Barabbas to them. He had Jesus whipped, then handed him over to be crucified.

### 6<sup>th</sup> Reading

## Crucified

The soldiers took Jesus, carrying his cross, to a place called Skull Place (in Aramaic, Golgotha). That's where they crucified him—and two others with him, one on each side and Jesus in the middle. Pilate had a public notice written and posted on the cross. It read "Jesus the Nazarene, the king of the Jews." Many of the Jews read this sign, for the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city and it was written in Aramaic, Latin, and Greek.

The Jewish chief priests complained to Pilate, "Don't write, 'The king of the Jews' but 'This man said, "I am the king of the Jews."

Pilate answered, "What I've written, I've written."

When the soldiers crucified Jesus, they took his clothes and his sandals, and divided them into four shares, one for each soldier. His shirt was seamless, woven as one piece from the top to the bottom. They said to each other,

"Let's not tear it. Let's cast lots to see who will get it."

This was to fulfill the scripture: They divided my clothes among themselves, and they cast lots for my clothing.
